COVID-19 has been categorized as a pandemic by the World Health Organization. It is a respiratory illness that can be spread from person-to-person. The virus that causes COVID-19 is a novel coronavirus that was first identified during an investigation into an outbreak in Wuhan, China. About 80 percent of COVID-19 cases result in mild symptoms, including fever, cough and occasionally shortness of breath. People with mild cases are expected to recover without issue, and some may not be aware they are ever sick. Every health care system in the U.S. is being challenged to respond to this pandemic and to work to control community spread. Cook County Health has developed a plan to reduce exposure risk and has outlined treatment plans for individuals who contract the virus . 
